Two Positions Open on Idalia RJ-3 Board

Let's meet the candidates. Jessica Towns, our first candidate, married Chad Towns and moved to Idalia in 1999 where she started her first teaching job. She taught 5th grade and 8th grade science for two years as well as summer school. She graduated high school from Bluestem in Leon, Kansas, and attended Butler County Community College to earn an Associates of Science Degree, and then later attended Friends University where she earned her Bachelor's in Elementary Education and a Master's in Education. She left teaching to have her first child and has continued to be involved in the school as a parent and a substitute teacher. She had her own home daycare during her time at home and then in 2007 helped start The Cub's Den Childcare Center. Education is important to Jessica. Having four children and her time spent teaching in the district, have inspired her to run for the school board. She would like to help facilitate and guide positive changes throughout the school. It is key to Jessica to help continue making Idalia a top-quality school. Jessica believes that little changes will make big improvements. Some changes Jessica would like to see are more accountability among the board, administration, staff, and students. She feels it is important to have respect for authority, each other, and the school itself. The final change Jessica would like to make is to have a full-time principal present. In order to have the accountability improve, as well as other things that need to change, she believes it would be a benefit especially with the increase of students in the school.

Our second candidate is Diana Pfeiler who was born and raised in Delta, Colorado. She attended college at Northeastern Junior College where she received an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Agri-Business. In 2006 she attended Morgan Community College and received her Associate of General Studies. She has been married to Jim Pfeiler for 38 years and has two kids—Amanda and Justin—both Idalia graduates. Diana is currently a bus driver at the Idalia School. She would like to be part of the school board so that she can voice her opinion, help the board grow, and do what's best for the students. She has been a part of the Idalia School for many years serving as a substitute teacher, bus driver, and has had her own children and grandkids attend the school. Diana has several goals she would like to see for the future of the Idalia School: one of these is getting back to basics, learning the 3R's—reading, writing, and arithmetic. She was saddened when she found out her granddaughter could not read or write in cursive. Another goal she has is for the seniors to apply for all available scholarships. Any monies that you get from scholarships help—even a small amount will buy books. To Diana being on the board means providing materials, books, etc., to aid the teachers in doing their job, so the students get to receive the best education that Idalia can give them. Also voicing her opinion—no one can change something by themselves, they have to voice their opinion and get the rest to see that their opinion is the best.

Barry Henrickson, the third candidate for the school board, grew up in Ault, Colorado, and graduated from Highland High School. He attended Aims Community College in Greeley, Colorado, where he took welding classes. In 1983 Barry started farming on his own and took over his family cattle operation. Two years later he married Terry. In 1995 they sold their cattle operation and moved to Idalia. In Idalia, Barry started another small commercial cattle feeding company and is now co-owner of a small trucking company. Barry ran for the school board, because at the time he talked to someone, there was only one person running, and he does not want to see the school board be appointed. He has a daughter that attends the Idalia School and has been a part of the school since he moved here in 1995. Barry has one major goal for the school and that is making sure the school stays financially solvent. Since Barry is not part of the board, he is not aware what can be changed because of school policies. If Barry were to get elected, he would have the school's best interest in all of his decisions. He is glad to see that the community has options because of five applicants competing for two positions.





LUNCH PROGRAM ADVANCES



The Healthy, Hunger Free Kids Act of 2010 mandated a variety of changes in nutrition standards for schools participating in the National School Lunch Program. Idalia RJ-3, seeing this as an opportunity to improve the health & wellness of our community, jumped on board and made changes as soon as they were announced by the USDA. Some of the changes are: Students must have ½ cup fruit or vegetable. There are now limits on how much meat/meat alternate and grains that can be offered. This means that some of the main dishes may not be as large as they have been in the past. Remember, there are more fruits and vegetables available to fill out the meal, so students will have plenty to eat! Other changes made for nutritional reasons include: sandwiches are served on whole wheat buns, all pasta served is whole grain, only low-fat or fat-free milk is served, dark green & orange vegetables are served on a weekly basis, and most noticeably, we instituted a daily salad bar so students can always find a fruit or vegetable that they enjoy eating, while also having the opportunity to try something new.

We understand that some of these changes have taken hold easily, while others are tough to adjust to. Research shows that when students eat healthy foods, they perform better in school. You have the power to inspire your children to build a healthy plate at school and at home. We ask that you review the school menu with your kids. The school nutrition program needs the support of parents to succeed! We welcome your feedback; empowered students continue to expand their palates! You can encourage your child to give meals a try, join him/her for lunch, and introduce your child to these healthy changes at home. Remember, school meals are designed to meet only a portion of a child's nutritional and energy needs in a day. Improving the health & nutrition of children by providing nutritious meals in school is a top priority for Idalia RJ-3 and the USDA. 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IDALIA SCHOOL BOARD NEWS

The September 16 meeting of the Idalia RJ-3 School board was called to order at 6:36 p.m. Attending the meeting were board members Kyle Kite, Ken Brenner, Nancy Helling, Larry Weyerman, and Ross Morris. Also attending were Business Manager Autumn Helling, Superintendent Tim Krause, and audience member Diana Pfeiler.

The consent agenda was approved with additions and the August minutes were approved by unanimous vote. Following a discussion regarding the business services' reports, all reports were accepted as presented.

Congratulations go out to Denise Cano and to Reagan Shaffer for finishing in the top 15 nationally in the American Enterprise Project contest in FBLA. Also noted by the board was the high school volleyball squad for undefeated status as well as their victories in winning the Bethune Invitational and the high school football team on a terrific start to the season. Rounding out the congratulations and celebrations portion of the meeting were positive reports on a CHSAA waiver for a student and the recent SIOP training for the entire teaching staff.

During Superintendent's reports, the upcoming Colorado Association of School Boards' Convention was discussed, information on CASB training in November for the newly-formed school board was explained, and the menu of graduation requirements required by the Colorado Graduation Guidelines legislation was introduced. A brief overview of the upcoming Colorado Education Initiative school climate survey was delivered and a short discussion ensued.

The discussion action items included approval of a 12-week maternity leave for an employee and the acceptance of a bid from Vince's GM Center on a 2016 Impala. No action was taken on a student request regarding a field trip to Austin, Texas.

Personnel decisions included the transfer of Jennifer Osborn to fill the vacant middle school position, hiring Cory Zion to assist in junior high football, and the approval of all winter coaching positions.

Policies IKA and IKA-R regarding assessment were adopted by unanimous vote after their second reading. The meeting was adjourned at 7:50 p.m. *Submitted by Tim Krause, Idalia Superintendent*


