PHYSICS STUDENTS BUILD BRIDGES

Physics students got to try their hand at architecture and construction with the recent tooth-pick bridge project. Bridges had to span a distance of 60cm and allow a Hot Wheels style car to drive over without any stunt driver maneuvers. Students could use toothpicks, paper clips, and wood glue. In addition, the bridges themselves could not weigh over 2.0 kilograms. The minimum load bearing weight was 2.0 kilograms. While a 1:1 weight to load ratio was all that was required, both Jennay Terrell and Luke Hull had ratios over 1:20!! It took all the masses in the physics lab plus a couple text books to finally find "the load that broke the bridge's

Back by popular demand, the Altius String Quartet will be performing on February 24 from 9:30-11:00 a.m. at Idalia School. The community is encouraged to join us for an hour and a half of exquisite music.

Hailed as "rich" and "captivating" by a renowned music blog, the Altius Quartet is quickly garnering an international reputation and enrapturing the hearts of audiences everywhere. Altius has just competed at the Seventh Melbourne International Chamber Music Competition as one of eight string quartets selected worldwide.

Formed in 2011 at Southern Methodist University Meadows School of the Arts, Altius holds the position as Fellowship String Quartet-in-Residence at the University of Colorado-Boulder, where they are mentored by the Takács Quartet. The quartet has an active performance schedule including engagements at music festivals, series, and universities throughout the United States. Highlights of the 2015-16 season include: performances at Music at Kohl Mansion in San Francisco and California State University in Fullerton, residencies at the Fayetteville Chamber Music Festival, the Western Slope Concert Series, and participation in the Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival as Shouse Artists. And of course, as Artists in Residence at Idalia K-12 School.

While at Southern Methodist University, Altius Quartet served as Ensemble-in-Residence working closely with Matt Albert, Emanuel Borok, and Andres Diaz. In addition, Altius has worked with and been guided by many of the foremost artists in chamber music including the Emerson String Quartet, Miro Quartet, Shanghai Quartet, Kronos Quartet, Arnold Steinhardt, Håkan Rosengren, and James Dunham.

Altius Quartet is deeply committed to outreach, often performing concerts and teaching master classes in public schools and alternative performing venues including: jazz clubs, bars, and cafes. In July 2013, the quartet commenced an educational residency with the Inspiration Point Fine Arts Colony where they performed for and mentored young artists in Eureka Springs, Arkansas. In addition, the quartet served as the 2014 fellowship quartet at the Music in the Mountains Conservatory in Durango, CO, where they had the opportunity to coach several young string quartets.

Founding member and violinist Andrew Giordano received his Bachelor of Music degree at Indiana University, Jacobs School of Music, where he studied with Kathleen Winkler, Federico Agostini, and Koichiro Harada. Giordano continued his studies at the Southern Methodist University, Meadows School of the Arts, where he completed a Masters of Music with

Emanuel Borok. Violinist Joshua Ulrich joined the quartet in the spring of 2014. Ulrich received his Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Artist Diploma from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and is currently a doctoral candidate from the same institution. During his tenure at the University of Cincinnati, he studied with Won-Bin Yim, Dorothy Delay, and Henry Meyer. Violist Andrew Krimm is a founding member of the quartet. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Colorado-Boulder where he studied with Erika Eckert and Geraldine Walther and received his Performer Diploma from Southern Methodist University, Meadows School of the Arts where he studied with Ellen Rose. Cellist Zachary Reaves is a founding member and received his Bachelor of Music and Performer Diploma from Southern Methodist University, Meadows School of Arts where he studied with Andres Diaz and Christopher Adkins.




Put your old LEGO bricks into new hands

Celebra Alebrijes – A Celebration of Folk Art and Poetry

Celebra Alebrijes was a collaboration of energy and ideas with visual artist Tony Ortega guiding our 106 elementary students (K-5) to create Alebrijes, fantastic animals, from recycled materials, newspaper, and bold paint. Beside him, Lisa Zimmerman, poet and creative writer, encouraged the students to use words to give life and voice to their creations and reveal the mystery of their origins. Alma wrote, "Add a fear of big lions and whisper 'leaves' into its mouth." Ty said, "He smells like summer never ends." Second grade Natalie wrote, "He looks like a black and orange sunset." Parents and other teachers stopped by to share in the excitement. With matching support from Think 360 Arts for Learning and Colorado Creative Industries, Idalia Elementary began the year fully engaged in the creative process.

The overarching goals of this residency included self-expression, creative problem solving, thoughtful reflection, engaging in the creative process, and cultural awareness. The Academic Standards met were numerous: observe and learn to comprehend and study art, invent and discover by generating works of art, relate and connect by personally linking to their art through poetry, attach meaning to their creations, relate art to diverse cultures, promote problem solving through deeper understanding of concepts and content, reason and make intellectual connections, use specific language, style, tone, text, and structure, and have a clear focus and sufficient elaboration and detail.


Success hinged on preparation and a passion for the process. We had professional artists and teachers who were committed and flexible, and adult and student volunteers who listened and facilitated. Careful planning was essential. We took a month to gather the recycled supplies and to order art supplies. Tony Ortega worked with elementary staff the day before we launched, showed them the steps and models for each, and explained how the following days would unfold. Each day Tony met all the children during breakfast to stage the day. Then in small group instruction, he modeled the steps. The volunteers joined during modeling time, then slid in to help and support, allowing Tony to weave through the students to assist or to begin the next group.

Lisa Zimmerman's poetry and prose workshops ignited the children with thoughtful models, colorful language, and creative prompts, resulting in breathtaking writing linked to the creative process and Alebrijes. Students wrote, "Think of the heartbeat as you feed him." "Get used to fur." "Build without thinking and dream on with your animal and enjoy it." "Your eyes are like flames." "You sound like wind blowing against a crooked little cottage." "I come from the quaky roads that rumble every time a car comes by." "He smells like fresh air, almost like he's not there." The kindergarten wrote, "O horse, your mane feels like a kingdom of fluff/O dinosaur, we miss your roar and swinging tail/O humming bird, I feel your silly flutter in my heart." Samantha summed up with this acrostic, "Animal creations are fun/Nice to chat with friends/Interesting to see people's animals/Made me try to be open-minded/Artistically wonderful/Like making a friend/Insanely beautiful/Time is short/Outstanding to see the process."

Lisa Zimmerman said, "The devotion and time given by the volunteers and teachers made the residency a crazy, wonderful success. When I shared details with (my husband) about the residency after I got home, he said, "Wow. How great to be a kid at that school!" It was a pleasure to work with Tony and the Idalia family.

The Idalia School District RJ-3 January Board of Education meeting was called to order at 6:35 p.m. on January 20. Once underway, the meeting's agenda was approved as were the minutes of the December 17 meeting and the Business Services' reports.

During the Congratulations and Celebrations portion of the meeting, it was noted that Reagan Shaffer was selected to play in the CADA All-State volleyball game this coming summer. Idalia Varsity Volleyball Coach Kylie Chamberlain was selected as a coach for this same game. Jason Dutton was selected to play in the 6-8 man All-State Game this coming June. Congratulations to all for being recognized for their outstanding efforts. Also in athletics, the Junior High Boys' Basketball was recognized for winning the Stratton Tournament.

Continuing the *Congratulations and Celebrations*, a brief discussion was held regarding the FFA member sale. The evening was well attended and volunteer auctioneer Brent Jacobson and his "ring men"—Ivan Cordova and Luke Hull—were very entertaining and did a great job. Thanks to all who attended the meal and participated in the auction and to Mr. Jacobson for lending his time and talent to FFA. 
Next on the agenda, Idalia Superintendent Tim Krause reported on several items concerning school business. The Accountability Committee meeting was held on January 19, with Reverend Charles Wright, Tara Garton, Judy Shively, Cindy Soehner, Lynne Cody, and Tim Krause in attendance. The teacher evaluation process for the district was explained and discussion regarding it structure and function followed. Continuing his report, Mr. Krause informed the Board that Andrea Louthan has resigned as the Vocational Agriculture instructor. It was also announced that the fire hall/bus barn will have ceiling mounted tube heaters installed. And finally, Mr. Krause indicated that the school has received its Small Rural Schools funding from the state.

Under Discussion/Action Items, after conversation and consideration, it was moved to approve the hiring of a full-time principal for the 2016-2017 school year and to advertise the open Kindergarten position as a three-fifths (3/5) contract. Both motions passed.

Under the Personnel services heading, it was moved to approve Heather Foreman as a substitute teacher. All members present voted aye.

As the meeting continued, five policies presented for adoption were all approved on second reading, and the preliminary reading of five policies were approved for second reading at the next Board meeting.
